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
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












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


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editorial

ONCE AGAIN, this will be a very busy musical and artistic summer in Canada. Whether you live in New Brunswick, Montreal, Quebec City, Ottawa, Hamilton, Toronto or Victoria, there is an arts festival nearby.

In this, La Scena Musicale's 17th annual Summer Festival issue, we present you with the most complete Guide to Canadian Music and Arts Festivals, including 102 classical music festivals, 800 concerts, almost 100 jazz festivals, over 100 world and folk festivals, as well as dance, theatre, film and visual arts festivals to help plan your musical and arts summer. Our writers also highlight the most exciting events on the Canadian music festival scene. 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reat string quartets aren't born, they are taught. For Keith Robinson, not only did the musical knowledge passed on to him as a student motivate the cellist to create the Miami String Quartet in 1988, but it remains foundational to the group's success foday.



"Our teachers at the Curtis Institute of Music were members of the Guarneri Quartet. We really looked up to them and were inspired by them," Robinson said. "David Soyer (the late founding cellist of the Guarneri) used to call me Scott. He was a bit scary, hairy and gruff, so that I didn't dare correct him. They were the greatest quartet ever."

Since its nascent days, the Miami String Quartet has gone on to win recognition in competitions around the world. It was the first string quartet in a decade to win the Concert Artists Guild New York Competition, in 1992. Now the Quartet-in-Residence at Kent State University in Kent, Ohio, Benny Kim (violin), MISOA are great. The objective is for these Cathy Meng Robinson (violin), Scott Lee (viola) and Keith Robinson (cello) will celebrate 25 years of music making in the 2013-14 concert season. In August, the foursome will open the McGill International String Quartet Academy (MISQA) in Montreal, performing works by Mozart, Shostakovich and Mendelssohn.

Like most chamber musicians, Robinson, who is also returning to MISQA as a professor for the second time, draws his influence from more than one source. Another mentor, Felix Galimir, the revered chamber musician and coach described by the New York Times in its 1999 obituary as "a violinist who was one of the last links to the vital musical world of prewar Vienna," was instrumental in starting many quartet careers. "His love of music was infectious and I couldn't help but learn to love quartets through him," said Robinson.

Now a link to the legend of Galimir and the Guarneri, Robinson credits organizations like MISQA for fostering a professional and specialized training ground, allowing promising

young quartets the chance to take their skills to the next level.

"The environment and atmosphere at young musicians to perfect the art of string quartet playing - musically and technically in an intensive learning environment with ideas shared on an international level by professors and participants alike," Robinson said. Usually, string quartets meet at competitions and everyone is more or less focusing on the goal at hand. At MISQA, there's this feeling of exchange and camaraderie that you can't find at competitions. There's a real sense of community that is being developed and friendships that are made for a lifetime.'

Because MISQA allows emerging quartets to discuss ideas and work with experts from different countries, many come to get their feet wet before competing at the triennial Banff International String Quartet Competition (BISQC), immediately following MISQA. In fact, three of the finalists are doing both: the Calidore (USA/Canada), Navarra (UK/Ireland/The Netherlands) and Schumann (Germany) quartets.

While every quartet has its own unique style, sound and approach, trying to achieve that

unique sound shouldn't be the ensemble's primary focus, Robinson believes. Rather, quartets should devote more time to interpreting the score. "A performer's first obligation is to the composer. What did the composer want here? Then the sound will come naturally," he explained. "Sometimes the 'aha' moment can take weeks, sometimes you just need to suggest a tempo change. It may take a while, but certainly when it comes, it's great."

However, regardless of how talented a quartet is, "It takes years for a quartet to develop a career, and this is accomplished through events like MISQA and BISQC and establishing ties with presenters and audiences," Robinson said.

Being in a string quartet is much like being in a marriage, with business and other challenges to deal with, according to Robinson. In fact, Robinson is married to the Miami String Quartet's second violinist, Cathy Meng. When they are on tour, the couple gets separate rooms so they can each practice separately.

Despite today's multimedia-rich society, Robinson remains confident about the future of classical music. "I certainly don't think classical music is dead. There are more string quartets today than ever before, due in large part to the popularity of the medium and the relatively low cost of presenting a string quartet, as opposed to a symphony orchestra or an opera," Robinson said. "We need to keep music in the schools, so children are exposed to classical music at an early age - not only listening to it, but even better, playing it." ISM

MISQA Spells Tradition

IN ITS FOURTH YEAR, the McGill International String Quartet Academy (MISQA) unites some of the foremost young string quartets from around the world to hone their skills through the guidance of experienced chamber musicians and concert performances. For its founder Constance V. Pathy and its director, André J. Roy, the oral tradition—the sharing of knowledge between teacher and student-is one of the academy's main focuses. This is not surprising seeing how many who have met this professor highlight his affability. With prestigious faculty again this year that includes Gerhard Schulz and Günter Pichler of the Alban Berg Quartet, Michael Tree of the Guarneri Quartet, Keith Robinson of the Miami Quartet, as well as the members of the Vogler String Quartet, participants are not short on mentors.

ISM The academy has really taken off since its inception in 2010. How did it come about?

ANDRÉ J. ROY: It's about people coming together, mainly our great founder Constance Pathy, the Cecilia String Quartet and myself. In 2010, I was working with the Cecilia Quartet whom Ms. Pathy helped join McGill for their studies. She was very interested in founding an academy here in Montreal, but there we were in April and the professors I was thinking about are usually booked two or three years in advance. I was trying to organize an international academy in May and June to be ready in August. It was absurd! I had a long conversation with Gerhard [Schulz], explaining what we wanted to do with the academy and he saw it as a place to grow and develop the next generation of string quartets. I was very lucky he accepted to do a full week that first year. He has been coming for the full two weeks ever since.

ISM The academy's rapid expansion attests to its increasing success over the years. When did you know you had something special?

AJR: When we did the first academy. The Cecilia Quartet went to the Banff competition and, as if from a movie script, they went on to win first prize. It sparked interest from a lot of people asking, "Who are these guys in Montreal?"

ISM What does the academy consider when selecting its participants?

AJR: At MISQA we have senior and junior quartets. Senior groups must be involved in the international scene (their selection at an International competition is actually a prerequisite) while the junior ones are quartets that aim to eventually be selected for international competitions.

LSM And how do you go about choosing professors?

AJR: You know who's out there, then you talk to people a year or two in advance. We have [amongst eight professors] the two violinists from the Alban Berg Quartet and the violist of the Guarneri Quartet: monumental quartets

They have all trained quartets who have won international competitions and are extremely devoted to teaching.

LSM What does a typical workshop look like?

AJR: In the mornings, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., we have private coaching sessions. I always try to have two violinists, a violist and a cellist at least present during that week-if you have someone who has made a career at being a second violinist, they will know everything in the repertoire inside out. Then, from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., one of the teachers will give a master class. We also offer recording sessions and other sessions with members of the McGill community such as sport psychologist and lawyers. The rest of the time [participants] practice individually and with their quartet.

LSM What goals does the MISQA set for its participants?

AJR: I want them to be in contact with the best practitioners out there. This is very much an oral tradition, which you can link to Haydn, Beethoven and Shostakovich who have worked with string quartets. I also wanted this program to be the image of Montreal: we always hear Montreal's a good mix between Europe and North America. I wanted people from Europe to benefit from what we do here and vice versa.

ISM What kinds of challenges do performers encounter in string quartet writing?

AJR: Each quartet has its own signature sound. There's a lot of giving involved and it's not about your own sound anymore. Your sound has to be part of a collective one, and that's the hardest thing to develop.

Most people are aware of the big name composers who contributed to the evolution of the string quartet genre, such as Haydn, Mozart, and Beethoven. Do you think there's a composer of string quartets out there who isn't given his or her fair due?

AJR: Thomas Adès is an amazing composer. For the performers, putting it together is a nightmare, it's so difficult! Once a quartet embarks on a career, the chamber music series that will offer them an opportunity will want to include Haydn, Bartók, Shostakovich, and so on. Once in a while they'll accept a modern piece, but not too often. String quartets have a repertoire they can offer during a given season, so if you're to spend half of your time learning a new piece-to be really good and keep being in demand-you have to make sure you'll be able to program it. For me, Adès or Wolfgang Rihm are not played enough, but they will be in the future when quartets have learned their repertoire. Every competition has a living composer write a piece, which is a way of having young quartets learn new music.



Julie Boulianne, New Dreams

t's been a whirlwind for Canadian mezzo Julie Boulianne. Since passing a 2009 audition at the Metropolitan Opera, Boulianne has lived out of her suitcase going from contract to contract, racking up frequent flyer points. At the Met alone, Boulianne has appeared five times in the last two years, singing Stephano in Gounod's Romeo and Juliet, Diane in Gluck's Iphigénie en Tauride with Placido Domingo and Susan Graham, and Sebel in Gounod's Faust, while covering Rossini's Comte Oru.

Boulianne was just finishing her studies at Juilliard when IMG, her New York agent, got her the Met audition. "I never imagined I could audition on that stage, where all the great singers have performed," explained Boulianne. Usually she dreads auditions, but she felt lucky as she sang arias from Meyerbeer's Les Huguenots and Rossini's La Cenerentola. "I didn't put pressure on myself. It was already a big thing to sing on that stage once in my life," she said. Having James Levine in the jury didn't seem to bother her either, and months later, she found out she got the part of Stephano. play the role of godmother to her sister's new-

Wasn't she intimidated by the size of the hall? "The Met is just shaped for singing, with the perfect theatre shape for opera. It's extremely big, but so is Wilfrid-Pelletier," laughing, Boulianne answered, referring to the Montreal Opera's home, where she cut her teeth.

The Met success opened doors for Boulianne, including her scheduled debut at Covent Garden in 2014, so now she doesn't have to audition much any more. Since last September, the mezzo had only been back to her Montreal home for two weeks, before returning in May for an extended series of concerts, recordings and the role of Marguerite in Berlioz's La Damnation de Faust at the Quebec Opera Festival in July. Her 2012-13 schedule included Ravel's L'Enfant et les sortilèges with the Boston Symphony and Dutoit, Beethoven's Ninth in Ottawa, the Met and the lead role of Romeo in Bellini's I Capuleti ed i Montecchi with the Reims Opera.

It's all the more reason for her decision to take her first and well-deserved real vacation this August: it shows that she's arrived and can say "No." "I need to do this to continue loving my job as much as I do right now," said Boulianne, admitting she'll just stay home and born son, and not think too much about music.

Boulianne is part of a new generation of Quebec singers who have made it big. "In my class at McGill, Etienne Dupuis, Michele Losier and Joshua Hopkins are also having great international careers," said Boulianne. [Ed Note: Dupuis and Losier have already been featured on the cover of LSM]. "You need only one singer in Quebec to do well to make other singers interested in doing the same thing. Before me, there were Lyne Fortin, Karina Gauvin and Marie-Nicole Lemieux (her cousin)."

How did a humble, down-to-earth girl from Lac St-Jean become one of Canada's leading mezzo sopranos, joining the ranks of fellow Quebecers Marie-Nicole Lemieux and Michele Losier?

When I first heard her in 2002, she had natural talent and seemed destined for great things. Going from advanced student to professional can be difficult, and for Boulianne, it was really psychological. "Sometimes, there is little difference between the voice of a professional and an advanced student. It's just how you think about yourself," she said.

One of her turning points was enrollment at the Canadian Vocal Arts Institute (in 2007)

and its parent, the International Vocal Arts Institute in Israel (in 2005 and 2007). "It was there I made the switch to professional artist," said Boulianne. "You hear everything from everywhere. You hear everybody's strengths and weaknesses and you become a better judge of where you are in comparison to what's done everywhere. People such as Joan Dornemann have heard everything and they know what's what. I learned that I had talent after all, and it's not something you have easily in Quebec because we francophones were the proletariat. When I was born, there was a philosophy that we were not born to be great, although I was always encouraged. When I was here, I used to work to fix the problems, rather than thinking of working on my strengths, and taking what works and putting it everywhere. It's a much more positive way of working," she explained.

Boulianne then spent two years at Juilliard

studying with Edith Bers. "My teacher had a good therapy: I had to give her a dollar every time I said something negative. I worked on singing naturally with the voice," she said. "My problem was that when you're too conscious of what you do, you're no longer natural. My process is to return to an even sound."

New York was very good to Boulianne. "Americans believe in making it and being the best they can," said Boulianne, who cautions that one should not confuse that with ambition, admitting, "I'm not ambitious, and I'm not very competitive; I'm the first to give up in a competition. But I want to be the best I can." That approach has allowed Boulianne to be a complete artist. "I am lucky as I have a diverse career, singing baroque, bel canto, romantic and contemporary," she said.

Already a Grammy nominated recording artist with her *L'Enfant et les sortilèges* on Naxos (from 2009), and a finalist for a Felix for a solo Mahler disc on ATMA, in June, Boulianne will be recording the eight Poulenc Polish Songs to complete a future ATMA 3-CD release songs by that composer. More recordings are in the works.

She will then head to Quebec City for Robert Lepage's staging of Berlioz's *La Damnation de Faust*, which debuted at the Met in 2008. Third time's a charm for Boulianne as she will finally sing this opera. Last season, a produc-





tion was cancelled due to financial reasons, and she was flown to Europe to replace an ailing singer who ended up not cancelling. After working with Lepage on Thomas Adès's *The Tempest* last summer, she is looking forward to the new experience. "With Lepage," she explained, "you get the impression that you are part of something bigger. We are proud of the results, and it motivates you to give more."

Boulianne finds the role is perfect for her high mezzo. "Berlioz has no core to the voice; there are big sections that are really high and big sections that are really low. Thomas Adès also likes the extremes of the voice; maybe he likes to make singers miserable. Berlioz is interesting as his music always goes to a place you don't expect. There are awkward turns that are not really natural," she said.

Her favourite part is the trio: "It is quite awesome, the coolest. It's a nightmare for everyone, three minutes of 'everybody is going to die, are we going to make it?' for the orchestra and the voices. It's a masterpiece."

For someone who seems to have been through it all, Boulianne advises young singers to be patient and disciplined, and to be aware of solitude. "I've done all my dream roles, such as Romeo and Elisa in Handel's *Tolomeo*. I've exceeded all my dreams thus far and I have to set new goals," she exclaimed.

Belgian violinist MARC BOUCHKOV [♠] is the grand prize winner of the 12th edition of the MONTREAL INTERNATIONAL MUSICAL COM-PETITION (MIMC). The 22-year-old was declared the winner on May 15, following his performance of Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto with the Orchestre symphonique de Montréal under the direction of guest conductor Maxim Vengerov. Bouchkov receives a cash prize of \$30,000 and a career development program valued at \$20,000. The \$15,000 second prize was awarded to 16-year-old Stephen Waarts (USA) and the \$10,000 third prize went to 16year-old Zeyu Victor Li of China. Following an international selection process from recorded submissions, 23 of the world's finest young violinists competed in Montreal for prizes valued at more than \$130,000. First established in 2002, the MIMC features violin, piano, and voice in rotating years. The most recent winners include baritone Philippe Sly (2012), pianist Beatrice Rana (2011).

JOHN [←] has announced that he will leave the ST. LAWRENCE STRING QUARTET at the end of this year. The Canadian violinist exits the Stanford-based quartet for London, Ontario, the city where he grew

up, along with his family. St. John, who frequently collaborates with his sister, violinist Lara St. John, joined the SLSQ in 2006. Founded in 1989, the St. Lawrence String Quartet came to international attention after winning the Banff International String Competition in 1992.



Several Canadian artists have been invited to perform at "CANADIAN DAY" on July 5 in Rome, as part of Le Nazioni or The Festival of Nations. The annual event, produced by ANN SUMMERS DOSSENA and hosted by Rome's Accademia Filarmonica Romana, invites countries to present their music and culture. Participating artists will include the Borealis String Quartet from Vancouver; violinist Guillaume Tardif of Edmonton; clarinetist KOR-NEL WOLAK [♠] of Toronto; Montreal soprano Jana Miller and pianist Jordan de Souza. The day's events also include films about Canadian icon Glenn Gould, with commentary courtesy of music critic William Littler. Canada is featured at the event for the first time this year, along with Norway, Brazil and Morocco.

In September the Edmonton symphony ORCHESTRA will launch YONA-Sistema, a three-year pilot music outreach program. The Youth Orchestra of Northern Alberta (YONA), based on the El Sistema program model developed over 35 years ago in some of the poorest regions of Venezuela, is a joint partnership with the Edmonton Catholic School District, the Rotary Clubs of Edmonton Riverview and Sherwood Park, and the Inner City Children's Program. Approximately 20 students in grades two and three at Mother Teresa Elementary School, located in Edmonton's city centre, will begin participating in an intensive, free-of-charge, after-school orchestra program for three hours, five days per week.

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Meanwhile, **EDMONTON OPERA** CEO **SANDRA GAJIC** has resigned, citing personal reasons. Director of Production Tim Yakimec takes over as interim business manager and the company will conduct a formal search in the near future. Edmonton Opera celebrates its 50th anniversary in the 2013-14 season.



Nearby CALGARY OPERA has a new resident conductor in CHRISTOPHER MOKRZEWSKI [1]. Currently music director of Toronto performing arts collective Against the Grain Theatre, Mokrzewski is also a member of the music staff at the Canadian Opera Company.

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THE SIR ERNEST MACMILLAN MEMORIAL FOUNDATION has announced its Award for 2014 in COMPOSITION FOR ORGAN, in recognition of MacMillan's celebrated career as a composer and organist. Canadian heldentenor **LANCE RYAN** made international headlines recently, but for the wrong reasons. Ryan failed to show up for a Saturday matinee performance of Wagner's *Siegfried* at the Berlin Staatsoper, where he

was to sing the title role, conducted by Daniel Barenboim. Tenor Andreas Schager, in town to sing *The Magic Flute* with the Berlin Philharmonic, was quickly summoned and covered the role until Ryan eventually arrived, in time for Act 2.

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THE ROYAL CONSERVATORY has named singer and songwriter Randy Bachman, producer Bob Ezrin, and soprano ADRIANNE PIECZONKA [→], Honorary Fellows. The artists were recognized at The Royal Occasion Gala, which took place in May at Koerner Hall in Toronto, where each performed, in addition to pianist Stephan Moccio, string duo 2Cellos, and students of The Royal Conservatory's Glenn Gould School.

Violinist, pedagogue and composer JEAN COUSINEAU has died, in Montreal, at the age of 75. Cousineau developed a violin method for young people inspired by Suzuki principals, travelling to Japan in 1965 to consult method founder Shin'ich Suzuki. The same year, he returned to Canada to found Montreal's École Les Petits Violons to train young violinists from the age of five. He counted Chantal Juillet, Angèle Dubeau and Martin Chalifour among his many pupils. Cousineau was also a prolific composer and wrote extensively for his Les Petits Violons ensemble and he composed numerous film scores including Mon Oncle Antoine, and Dream Speaker, which won the Prix Anik and the film-music prize at the Canadian Film Awards in 1977.

The NATIONAL ARTS CENTRE ORCHESTRA will embark on its first tour to China this October. Music Director PINCHAS ZUKERMAN, who will also perform as a soloist, and 70 musicians from the orchestra will travel to seven cities: Hong Kong, Guangzhou, Chongqing, Fuling, Tianjin, Beijing, and Shanghai. The NAC Orchestra will perform eight major concerts with more than 80 education and out-

reach activities and five international broadband videoconference events linking young musicians in Canada and China. The tour program will include works by Canadian composers John Estacio and Alexina Louie, whose *Bringing The Tiger Down From The Mountain II*, will feature principal cellist Amanda Forsyth. The opening concert in Hong Kong will be presented in collaboration with the Hong Kong Sinfonietta, with more than 130 musicians on stage.

TORONTO SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA music di-

rector PETER OUND-JIAN'S [♠] contract had been extended to 2017. Announced with little fanfare, Oundjian's contract extension will place him on the orchestra's podium for a total of 12 years. A former violinist with the Tokyo String Quar-





tet, Oundjian is currently in the first season of his music directorship with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra.

And, the MISSISSAUGA SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA will have its first new music director in 35 years. As of this summer, conductor DENIS MASTROMONACO [L] replaces John Barnum, who has been music director since 1978.

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In major conductor news south of the border, 32-year-old Latvian conductor ANDRIS NELSONS [♠] has been tapped as the next music director of the BOSTON SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA, beginning in the 2014-15 season. Nelsons, who succeeds the health problem-riddled James Levine, is seen as one in a new generation of charismatic young maestros, alongside Montreal's Yannick Nézet-Séguin.

Bloom of Youth: Jan Lisiecki

Canada's newest piano superstar reflects on his young career

ow does it feel to be 18 and on top of the world? Just ask Jan Lisiecki, Canada's newest piano superstar. Born in Calgary to Polish parents, Lisiecki took up piano at five and made his orchestral debut at nine. In just a few years, he's already reached the top -playing in important venues with great orchestras. In 2012, Jan had the honor of opening the Chopin 200th birthday celebrations in the composer's birthplace, in Poland. Now a second-year student at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto studying with Marc Durand, Lisiecki maintains a hectic schedule of some 100 performances a year. How many 18-year-olds can boast having an exclusive contract with Deutsche Grammophon, arguably the most prestigious recording label in classical music? At the time of signing, Jan was all of 15, the youngest pianist to sign with the recording giant.

Lisiecki recorded his first solo recital of Chopin Etudes for DG at Koerner Hall in January. I sat in on one of the sessions. Present were Ute Fesquet, Jan's record producer, Jan's mother, and the recording engineers. It was fascinating to observe how he works - all business and no nonsense, sitting at the piano with headphones on to communicate with the control booth, tirelessly playing one take after another. "He's maturing before our eyes," beams Fesquet. "You can listen and watch how a piece is growing from take to take. He knows exactly what he wants to achieve in this music.' Lisiecki is mature beyond his years, and there's sincerity and depth to his music making. After the recording session, we sat down in the green room for a little chat.

How do you like the recording process versus a live performance?

JL: I try to make every take into a live performance – I play like I'm playing for an audience. Ninety-nine percent of my takes are complete takes. That's how I like to work.

ISM How would you define yourself as an artist?

JL: That's a difficult but interesting question! I think different people will hear different things (in my playing), but I try to show how beautifully each piece is already written by the composer, not how well I can play – how fast or how perfectly.

You already have a brilliant technique and poetic imagination. What else do you think makes a true artist?



JL: You have to be a well-rounded person to be an artist – I work on that all the time. To play really well, you have to have something behind (the playing) – the thoughts, the experiences. For me, it's going to museums, galleries, walking around the cities in Europe, trying to learn something about the place, meeting people. This makes you into an artist, not just a technician. You can be a very good technician if you practice eight hours a day, work and work; you can play the *Etudes* really cleanly, but you are not telling a story, sharing your thoughts.

Your career has blossomed without major competitions. What are your thoughts on competitions?

JL: For many they are great – to be heard, to have performance experience. That being said, for me the primary goal in a competition is to perform. To get to the finals, (my goal) is to perform with an orchestra. That's much more important to me than first prize or money. But I'm thankful that I don't have to do competitions. I am an anti-competitive person.

How do you foresee your career developing in the future? What will you be playing a year or five years from now?

JL: A year from now? That far ahead I know – it's in my calendar (chuckle). Lots of orchestras, in Canada, US, Europe, Asia. In the future? I just hope I'll continue to perform, to love what I do. I hope to get an education – I have two more years (for the Bachelor of Music at the Glenn Gould School).

What are you interested in, outside of music?

JL: Theatre, opera, painting, sculpture...all kinds of art. I love it. Outside of the arts, I love

to travel...it's my second favourite thing after performing.

What's your favourite place so far in your travels?

JL: I don't really have a favourite place. I can say one thing for sure – after having traveled to so many countries, I love Canada. I love coming home. I can't imagine moving anywhere else.

Chopin: Etudes Op. 10 & 25

Jan Lisiecki, piano

Deutsche Grammophon CD 4791039

This is the second (and first solo) disc for Deutsche Grammophon by Canada's newest piano superstar, Jan Lisiecki. These Chopin Etudes were recorded in January



2013 at Koerner Hall of the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, where Lisiecki is a student. Sitting in on one of the sessions, I was impressed by his power of concentration, poetic imagination, and work ethic. With this very popular repertoire, Lisiecki is breaking into an extraordinarily crowded field of heavyweights past and present. We're talking about a roster that includes Ashkenazy, Perahia, Pollini, Horowitz, Argerich, Cortot, Freire, Cherkassky - the list goes on. The last time DG recorded these pieces was way back in 1972 with the great Maurizio Pollini! How does the young Lisiecki compare? Typically opinions vary, but to my ears, there's a great deal to enjoy. There is no question that he has the technical prowess to do even the most demanding pieces justice, such as Op 10, No. 12 and Op. 25, No. 10. There is a maturity and a natural, unaffected quality to his playing that's appealing. That said, when it comes to depth of expression and musicality, it's too soon to say Lisiecki has reached the exulted levels of some of the great ones mentioned above. Only 17 at the time of recording, Lisiecki has youth on his side, and given his prodigious talent, there's no doubt that he will continue to develop. For now, we have a young pianist of great promise, in a repertoire where he shows uncommon affinity and flair. The recorded sound is clear and warm. The booklet has a short essay by Michael Church in four languages, plus photos, including one of his recent recital at Koerner Hall. Highly recommended.



Ensemble Caprice takes on

Hi's Matezuma

he Montreal Baroque Festival (June 21-24) will host Ensemble Caprice's reconstruction of Vivaldi's opera Motezuma, a partial score of which was discovered in Berlin in 2002. The Montreal premier of this opera is a staging midway between concert and opera, taking the original work in a new artistic direction. Recitative and baroque arias will combine with the main actor's narration against a backdrop of music with a contemporary feel. Digital technology will also come into play in order to recreate the captivating story of the last Aztec emperor. It will be quite a programme. "This is our biggest project," says Matthias Maute, artistic director of Ensemble Caprice, which has been described by The New York Times as "an immensely thoughtful and progressive force on the musical scene." He confides that "performing this opera is a challenge in itself, given the particular care with which Vivaldi composed it. It was especially important to him that this piece be of the highest quality." Maute adds that he has found it extremely stimulating to work with performers from the Atelier Lyrique de Montréal.

"Reconstructing this work, premiered in 1733, is a test of my ability to internalise the spirit of Vivaldi's style," Maute says. Waxing eloquent on the virtues of the Italian composer, more renowned for his concertos than for his operas, he explains, "In order to re-compose the 17 missing movements, I had to immerse myself in the context for the composition of Motezuma. Aged 55, Vivaldi was at the peak of his capacities, but he was under great pressure from the imposing Neapolitan School with its arias and Galant style." In fact, according to composer Maute and his Ensemble Caprice colleagues, Motezuma is a summary of Vivaldi's relationship to opera. "Vivaldi as an opera composer had yet to be



discovered," says Maute, expressing his fascination for Vivaldi's "wonderful feel for storyline." And yet the operas did not meet with the success their composer had hoped.

BIRTH OF AN OPERA

"Vivaldi wanted to retain his particular style and ideas about operatic composition at all costs. Of course, he ended up compromising by inserting a few Neapolitan-style arias into his works, but he never identified fully with the Neapolitan school," says Maute. This could explain why his operas met with less success than his concertos. In fact, the genesis of the pieces adds to their appeal; they are emblematic of the composer's style. Vivaldi varied musical and harmonic colour and did not hesitate to use instruments that were uncommon in operatic compositions at the time. "In my version," says Maute, "I've taken all these elements into account for a mix that recreates the spirit of the piece and its context. For example, I wrote an

aria recreating the Neapolitan style with its triplets and distinctive harmonic structure, for arias, as we all know, are the salient points of Baroque opera. Above all, I want to produce an interpretation that is faithful to the innovative essence of Ensemble Caprice, its signature and personal artistic sensitivity." He stresses that Ensemble Caprice is committed to reviving early music in a living fashion, connecting the past to the present in all its activities. "Performance must be more than just repetition. The biggest problem with classical music today is that music from the past is repeated over and over in the same way. On the contrary - performing early music should give pieces a new life by relocating them in the present day and responding to the needs of today's audiences," he explains.

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MOTEZUMA: AN EXTRAVAGANT PLOT

MOTEZUMA WAS PREMIERED in Venice in 1733 at the Sant'Angelo Theatre. Alvise Giusti's libretto tells the story of Moctezuma II, last emperor of Mexico. Motezuma, defeated, is wanted by the soldiers of Spanish conquistador Fernando Cortés. The fallen emperor asks his wife Mitrena to kill their daughter Teutile to prevent her from falling into the hands of the Spanish. Destinies



collide in the ensuing events, and a captivating and unpredictable plot unfolds. At the end, Teutile marries Ramiro, Cortés's brother.

The score that German musicologist

Steffen Voss discovered in 2002 in the archives of the Berlin Sing-Akademie is missing the beginning of Acts I and III and the finale of Act III. Only Act II is complete. In the version that Ensemble Caprice performs on June 21, 2013, at the Montreal St-James Theatre, the reconstructed score is composed of 31 movements, 14 of which were written by Vivaldi.

10 Years of Tania Miller in Victoria

INCE TANIA MILLER'S debut in August 2003 at the very popular Victoria Symphony Splash, the Foam Lake, Saskatchewan native has stamped her musical identity onto the Victoria Symphony, revamping virtually every section of the 55-piece ensemble.

According to expert observers who have followed the orchestra's development during her tenure, Miller has markedly improved how the group makes music and where it stands in the community.

Timothy Vernon, Pacific Opera Victoria's artistic director, has enlisted the Victoria Symphony in his productions for more than 30 years. He hasn't always been pleased, but since Miller has taken charge, Vernon says it's always a pleasure to lead her refashioned group in the pit of the Royal Theatre, where both the Victoria Symphony and Vernon's opera company perform. "She has strengthened the orchestra as a playing body immeasurably. ... She has made some excellent hires, in consultation with the colleagues in the orchestra itself. The orchestra has improved more than what I would have expected," Vernon says.

Victoria Times Colonist classical music reviewer Kevin Bazzana has also been impressed with the quality of the orchestra under Miller's leadership. "There's no ques-

tion that the orchestra today is better than it has ever been, both in terms of personnel and leadership," Bazzana says.

"I've heard other musicians say this, too—locals as well as visitors. Technically she's very accomplished, and in turn she's raised the technical level of the orchestra; it's a tight, polished ensemble now, and I don't think there's anything they couldn't play."

The nine new violinists, especially new concertmaster, Terence Tam, have impressed Vernon, although the contentious dismissal of the 20-year-veteran concertmaster Pablo Diemecke generated a legal fight and internal acrimony.

Miller has also filled assistant principal and principal second violins chairs, and has hired a new principal cellist, a new principal and second bassoon, a new principal and second horn, a new principal trumpet, a new principal percussion, and a new second trombone and tuba.

All of these changes may be attributed to an idealism the then 33-year-old Miller had when she came to the job as the first woman to lead a major Canadian orchestra.

Despite few female conductor role models, Miller has never believed her gender should affect the way she does her job. She admits, though, that being both young and a woman made her feel she had to prove herself, a challenge, she believes, that exists for every young conductor, man or woman.

"When conductors stand on the podium, they don't really have much time before an or-

chestra has decided how much they are feeling inspired or not by their work," says Miller. "I have always felt that upon first appearance I had to prove myself. I was fairly young. I was a woman. Any orchestra that I have stood in front of begins in a skeptical phase. And there's good reason for it."

> Now 43, Miller believes that her growth strategy and her determination are paying off. When she started, she wanted to peel through as much orchestral repertoire as she could.

"In my first six or seven years, I refused to conduct anything twice. I really wanted to learn as much repertoire as possible, so I was constantly throwing myself into new scores," she says from her home in Vancouver, where she lives with her husband and two boys. She commutes to Victoria for

13 weeks a season.

As she revisits repertoire, she feels that her understanding of the music and her confidence as a conductor have grown. "The truth is you've got to have the experience of performing these works to really be great at them," she explains. "As conductors we can only get better and better with age."

From the outset, Miller was determined to give her audience, which Bassano describes as "very conservative, even by symphony orchestra standards," the time-tested repertoire, but also to guide them toward unfamiliar territory in contemporary music.

For the past eight years, she has offered a new-music festival. In September 2011, Miller presented a program inspired by iconic west coast artist Emily Carr, which included five new commissioned works. Last November, the orchestra celebrated the 100th anniversary of John Cage's birth. In February, to celebrate the 155th anniversary of Canada's oldest Chinatown, the Symphony commissioned a new work by Chan Ka Nin, which it incorporated into a multimedia festival in the Victoria Chinese community itself. Next season, the focus is on Ligeti.

Miller also incorporates new music into her two classical series, the Legacy and the Signature, the way an art curator might organize an exhibit to show the influences of masters on some more challenging contemporary artists' work. She says she wants to be a guiding hand for her audiences and Bazzana feels that audiences like her nurturing approach.

Contracted through 2015-16 with an option for an additional season, Miller concedes she has had to recalibrate some of her initial ambitions to accommodate her audience's appetite for new musical experience, which she insists is greater than some people might give Victoria, a Canadian retirement haven, credit for.

"When I first came in, I had all these ideas for new series, new directions. And I realized I couldn't move as quickly as I wanted to. It would be unwise to do so," she adds. "I really want the organization to be healthy and strong and for the orchestra to be foremost in everybody's mind."

The 24th edition of the Victoria Symphony Splash concert takes place August 4 in the Victoria Harbour. About 40,000 people are expected to attend.

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
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

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Rite

Transcriptions of Stravinsky's *The Rite of Spring* and *Petrouchka* by Jon Kimura Parker (World Premieres)
Jon Kimura Parker, piano **www.jonkimuraparker.com**

To celebrate the 100th anniversary of Stravinsky's *The Rite of Spring*, the ever-original Canadian pianist Jon Kimura Parker has issued his own transcriptions of this work, paired with



the ballet Petrouchka. The Rite of Spring shocked the Paris audience back in 1913, and at the grand old age of 100, it remains fresh and scintillating. Even without the ballet and the orchestra, the experience of just listening to the two works' once novel harmonies and rhythms remains an arresting experience. Parker is faithful to the original scores, fully capturing the organic and visceral nature of the two pieces, with their often savage and unsettling rhythms and full palette of tone colours. The recording, captured at Rice University in Houston, Texas in 2009 and 2012, is warm and richly resonant. The program notes, on the genesis of the two transcriptions, are suitably in the pianist's own words. This self-produced CD amply illustrates Parker's artistry and is one of the outstanding releases of a still young 2013. **JOSEPH K. SO**

Nissman Plays Ginastera

Alberto Ginastera (1916-1983); Concerto Argentino (1935); Piano Concerto No. 1 Op. 28 (1961); Piano Concerto No. 2 Op. 39 (1972) (original version)

The American pianist Barbara Nissman has long been a champion of Alberto Ginastera's music. She first met him at the University of Michigan in 1970, when she appeared as soloist



in his *Piano Concerto 1*, which she went on to play again with several major American orchestras. Ginastera's final work, the *Sonata No. 3*, is dedicated to her. Nissman has previously recorded all of Ginastera's piano music and music for piano and chamber ensemble on Newport Classic and is currently available on Pierian 0005/6.

In the light of this background, and the inclusion of the first recordings of the early *Concierto Argentino* and the original version of the *Piano Concerto No. 2*, this new recording is historic. Moreover, Nissman plays Gi-

nastera's music with authority and panache.

Composed at age 19, the Concierto Argentino demonstrates Ginastera's love of Argentinian folk melodies and rhythms and his vivid imagination in writing for the piano. Especially memorable is the dissonant seconds in the last movement to suggest out-of-tune folk instruments. It is an exciting piece and Nissman plays with the required exuberance. The orchestra is fine too although the percussion might have benefited from a little restraint.

In 1961, when he wrote the *Piano Concerto No. 1*, Ginastera was a well-established and mature composer. For the most part it avoids the folkloric elements prominent in the Concierto Argentino. The first three movements are more cerebral. The second and third movements feature transparent textures and extremely quiet music. Only in the final toccata does it truly explode. This is music exploiting the piano's percussive potential in the manner of Bartok and Prokofiev. Nissman is equal to all facets of the piece and the orchestra contributes some extremely sensitive playing.

The Piano Concerto No. 2 is even more uncompromising. The strength of the piece is in its dramatic contrasts in dynamics. The second movement scherzo, a very clever interplay between soloists and orchestra, is for right hand only. The slow third movement drags on somewhat. The last movement is a real rouser, with vivid percussion and plenty of work for the pianist. With her excellent performance Nissman makes the case for the piece to "become a staple of the twentieth-century piano concerto literature." This new recording presents Ginastera's original version, as the first recording by Austrian pianist Hilde Somer (who actually commissioned the work) contains major alterations, including a lefthanded scherzo. Dvořák: Stabat Mater Op. 58

Janice Watson, soprano; Dagmar Peckova, mezzo soprano; Peter Auty, tenor; Peter Rose, bass; London Philharmonic Orchestra and Choir/Neeme Järvi Recorded live at the Royal Festival Hall October 9, 2010

This great choral work used to be enormously popular but in recent years it has become a rarity in concert halls and on recordings. The first and last movements are enormously



dramatic and powerful while the inner movements are more lyrical. Unusual in a large choral work from this period, there is very little contrapuntal writing except in the final Amen. Neeme Järvi has the measure of the work and leads an outstanding performance. One of the essentials of the piece is to keep it moving—somewhat counter-intuitive given the subject matter—and he does just that. In the outside movements he builds tremendous climaxes and elsewhere finds lightness where the music requires it.

Among the soloists, tenor Peter Auty is very good indeed, especially in his solo "Fac me vere tecum flere." All the performers sound committed and inspired and the LPO Choir responds superbly to Järvi's authoritative direction.

Prokofiev: Symphony No. 5 Op. 100/The Year 1941 Op. 90

Sao Paulo Symphony Orchestra/Marin Alsop Naxos 8.573029 (59 min 48 s)

Brazil has been forging ahead in recent years as an economic powerhouse, and on the evidence of this recording its musical life is not far behind. The São Paulo Symphony Orchestra is



a first-rate ensemble and under its new music director, American Marin Alsop, it is sure to become better known within a short time. Just recently it made its first appearance at the Proms.

Homebase for Alsop is the Baltimore Symphony, with whom she has already made many recordings, but by all accounts she will be commuting to Brazil on a regular basis. She leads an exciting and powerful performance of Prokofiev's familiar *Fifth Symphony*. The brass and percussion will lift you out of your seat—watch out for that tam-tam—but the winds and strings make stylish and expressive contributions too.

The filler piece is the all but unknown *The Year 1941*, which evokes the Nazi invasion of the Soviet Union early in World War II. It was not well-received at its first performance and there seems to be no reason to change that judgement. Lots of patriotic fervor but little musical substance.

D'Albert: Die Abreise

Lotte Schädle (Luise); Erwin Wohlfahrt (Trott); Willy Ferenz (Gilfen); Symphonieorchester des Bayerischen Rundfunks/Jan Koetsier

Eugen d'Albert wrote no less than 20 operas, although none ever bore enough weight to become part of the classical repertoire. The composer fashioned Wagnerian masterpieces as well as short comic operas, like the Die Abreise (The Departure), one of his most successful

works. The story is fairly straightforward: passion no longer reigns in Gilfen and Luise's marriage. The former wants to take a short trip, but hesitates in fear that his wife will betray him in



his absence. He suspects his friend Trott-and rightly so-for wanting to steal her away. He finally decides to announce his leave, but stays hidden, hoping to catch the guilty parties in the act. Trott, as suspected, makes his advances, but Luise remains faithful to Gilfen and rejects him. The two lovers retrieve their lost passion, and Trott is back to square one. The music is delightful, filled with simple and cheery melodies. The recording was originally made during a performance of the opera in 1964 in Munich. All the soloists excel in their roles, both as singers and actors. A very nice addition that would be wonderful to see on stage. At under 45 minutes, it's difficult to get bored! FRÉDÉRIC CARDIN

It appears that attempts are being made to ensure the importance and the domination of the disc (regardless of its form and appearance) in a most astute audiophilic market, such as



the recent Blu-Ray technology that occasionally comes up in the new releases bins. Unfortunately, the resistance will likely be short-lived, given that downloading technologies are perfecting themselves at lightning speed and are offering more and more listening options on digital files. Of course, the tangible enjoyment that comes with the physical case and booklet (or the vinyl sleeve!) are lacking, but Kindles and other e-Readers will soon offer stimulating accompaniments to our music-loving experiences. In the meantime, there are records such as this one, remarkably detailed and attentive to the requirements of the most demanding music connoisseurs. Two weeks were needed to create the recording, due more to the principle at stake than to economic logic. The result is, admittedly, downright luxurious. The magnitude of the sound is impressive, and the warmth of the Norwegian ensemble's strings is irresistible and magnificently captured by the engineers. Tchaikovsky (Souvenir de Florence and the Sérénade) and Neilsen (the Suite pour cordes) are on the program. The Trondheim soloists sound as if they were

Mozart: String Quartets (complete)

Pascal String Quartet Recorded c. 1952

DOREMI DHR-8001-5 (5 CDs) (368 m 8 s)

The Pascal String Quartet was formed in the early 1940s and was active through the 1950s. It was one of the finest chamber music ensembles ever developed in France and it made a



number of recordings that were highly regarded in their day. Jacob Harnoy, mastermind of DOREMI in Toronto, has done music-lovers a great service by restoring their recordings to the catalogue. This is outstanding quartet playing and the 1952 sound is remarkable.

In 2008 DOREMI released a set of Mozart and Haydn recordings (DHR-7846-8) by the contemporaneous Loewenguth Quartet. Comparing the two French groups in the same Mozart quartets makes for fascinating listening. Both ensembles are excellent but the Pascal plays with far more virtuosity and much more unanimity, and benefits from far superior sound.

This album bears the subtitle "Vol. 1." That means we have more glorious recordings to look forward to. In the meantime, don't hesitate to acquire these splendid Mozart performances. They are comparable to the best recordings of this music ever made.



Music is the Language of the Soul: A Portrait of Mariss Jansons; Mahler: Symphony No. 2 "Resurrection"

Latvian conductor Mariss Jansons turns 70 next year, and for a conductor, that means he is in his prime. He is the music director of two of the world's great orchestras—the Royal Concertgebouw and the Bavarian Radio Symphony—and his performances these days are consistently mature and unaffected. That is certainly the case here with a Mahler Second that is faithful to virtually every marking in Mahler's score while being dramatic and inspiring. Jansons is never 'over the top' in the Bernstein manner but he has a sure sense of

how to build a climax and how to achieve just the right orchestral colour for every moment of the score. In that sense he is more like his mentor Herbert von Karajan.

There are two DVDs in this album and the



first of them is devoted to a documentary about Jansons. We see him visiting old haunts in Riga and St. Petersburg, but Jansons comes across as somewhat self-effacing and reserved. Perhaps it is the fault of director Robert Neumüller that he was not able to get the conductor to reveal more of himself.

In the last decade or so of his life Leonard Bernstein travelled to the major musical centres of the world giving concerts and most of them were videotaped. Not all of them were released in his lifetime (1918-1990), and here are two more per-



formances being released for the first time.

Bernstein had a close association with the Vienna Philharmonic and together they recorded most of the major works of Beethoven and Mahler among others. The Beethoven quartet recorded here is rarely done in a version for string orchestra and not only because it is very difficult. There is also the question of whether the composer's conception absolutely requires one player to a part. In any case, the VPO makes the best possible case for the transcription and Bernstein conducts with great insight in this 1989 performance.

The Haydn Mass in Time of War was recorded in 1984 in an extraordinarily beautiful setting: Ottobeuren Basilica. Throughout his Bernstein was both an eloquent advocate for peace – he opposed the Vietnam War by conducting this very mass in Washington, D.C. – and an authoritative Haydn interpreter. This is a wonderful performance.

FESTIVAL DE LANAUDIÈRE - JULY 13 - AUGUST 11

Festival de Lanaudière opens on July 13 with a concert by the Festival Orchestra and Alain Lefèvre performing Ravel's Concerto en sol, and closes on August 11 with the Orchestre Métropolitain under Yannick Nézet-Séguin performing Wagner's Lohengrin, featuring soprano Deborah Voigt and other soloists. OM makes another appearance on the first Sunday of the festival, with Mathieu Lussier at the helm. The Orchestre symphonique de Montréal performs two concerts, conducted by Kent Nagano: Brahms' Double Concerto for Violin and Cello featuring James Ehnes and Jan Vogler, and the following day, with Emmanuel Ax performing Mozart's Piano Concerto nº 27. The Symphony will also perform Beethoven's Symphony no 3 (August 9) and Mahler's Symphony nº 1 (August 10.) The Orchestre symphonique de Ouébec and its new conductor Fabien Gabel appear on August 2 with violist Antoine Tamestit. Just one recital at the amphitheatre this season: Marc-André Hamelin playing Haydn, Scriabine and Medtner.

Young stars Stéphane Tétreault and Jan Lisiecki, darlings of the festival circuit, will both perform at Lanaudière. Tétreault will join the Orchestre du Festival for Britten's Symphony for Cello and Orchestra, while Lisiecki will perform Grieg's *Piano Concerto* with the Orchestre de l'Académie Orford.

Piano and pianoforte take center stage at the festival's church venues. On July 31 Alexandre Tharaud will perform the North American premiere of a piece for choir and piano by Thierry Pérou. Two concerts at the end of July are dedicated to Poulenc: the first featuring works for two pianos with the Fung-Chiu Duo, the second featuring cello and piano with Yegor Dyachkov and Jean Saulnier.

This year the Festival celebrates choral music with a *Grand fête* on July 19. *Tous en chœur* is a concert that invites amateur choristers to take the stage to perform Martin Palmeri Misa a Buenos Aires, a mass based on Argentinian Tango music, and Karl Jenkins' Te Deum. lanaudiere.org

On August 10 Marie-Nicole Lemieux, Benedetto Lupo and the Quatuor Arthur-Leblanc present a program of Schubert, Respighi, Debussy and Chausson. On August 16 soprano Pascale Beaudin performs Chausson's Urbania with the Orchestre de la Francophonie. Andréa Tyniec, winner of the 2012 Canada Musical Instrument Bank, will also participate in the concert.



or its upcoming 34th edition starting on June 28, the organizers of the Festival International de Jazz de Montréal (FIJM) have elected to honour the late Dave Brubeck. To mark the pianist's death on the eve of his 92nd birthday last December, it has invited his sons to a perform a tribute concert for its final evening on July 7.

As important as Brubeck's passing is to the event, it also represents the loss of one of the few musicians to have experienced jazz's golden years first-hand. Not only was he privileged to see the founders of the art in action, but his exposure to them also inspired him to make his own personal contributions to the music.

Nowadays, the are few survivors of that era still around and active on the scene; Lee Konitz, Phil Woods and Barry Harris are among the last of the breed. In the face of this reality, the current generation of young musicians will soon be unable to rub shoulders with their predecessors, thus curtailing the natural process of learning the music by playing it on the job, night in, night out. Some will argue that schools are filling this void, but knowledge is acquired very differently here, by means of a structured curriculum rather than on a trial-and-error basis.

In this current state of affairs, festivals also play a very particular role, especially when it comes to disseminating the music. In 1980, when the FIJM was founded, no such festivals were to be found anywhere else in the country, notwithstanding a few short-lived attempts. Across the border, the festival landscape boiled down to Newport and Monterrey, whereas Europe was ahead of the game with more than a smattering of events happening year-round.

Historically, clubs were for the longest time the sole outlets for jazz, but the music would gradually find its way into concert halls and gain some legitimacy as an art form. But it wasn't until the blossoming of the festival scene that jazz would achieve greater public visibility. Without these events, it would most likely have lost whatever attention it had in the media, far more interested in hyping the latest

While the term "jazz" is universally recognized, its definition is more elusive than ever. Globalization has inevitably dissolved all stylistic borders, and festivals have definitely had their say in this state of affairs. Be it the FIJM or any other member of the Jazz Festivals Canada network, one conclusion is inevitable when looking at their respective programs: jazz is basically what its artistic directors want it to be. And as the media follows suit, so does the audience. On one hand, festivals can lean towards popular music to better entice musical consumers; on the other hand, they should not completely dismiss the interests and expectations of die-hard music-lovers, some adhering to the tried and true, others attuned to more experimental strands of freely improvised music making. What's more, festivals always want to be abreast of the latest trends, hence the hot-ticket artist of the year who makes the rounds. But keeping up with the times is only half of their story; indeed, these events constitute a memory of the way things were and offer many bright moments with artists no longer with us.

Looking beyond the Brubeck tribute, there are two basic subtexts that underlie this year's festival in Montreal, the first aimed at celebrating the remaining survivors of a bygone era, and the other at promoting new talent born out of a totally different reality.

Case in point, the Invitation series illustrates this discrepancy between a vanishing past and a present of seemingly limitless possibilities. The first of two artists billed here is



tenor saxophonist CHARLES LLOYD who will play on three consecutive evenings. Having reached the respectable age of 75 last March, Lloyd is a direct descendant of John Coltrane, and an authentic jazzman who was part and parcel of the heady 60s. In fact, his quartet of that period, which included future superstar Keith

Jarrett, was one of the first jazz bands to break into the psychedelic rock circuit. In the second half of this series, the spotlight will shine on VIJAY IYER, an American pianist of Indian descent. Sandwiched between a solo performance and another by his own trio (heard by this reviewer during the 2010 edition) will be a duo with fellow keyboardist Craig Taborn. Both in their early forties, these musicians are currently hot property in the jazz world, each of them backed by their respective and very noteworthy labels, Act Records and ECM.

Elsewhere in the festival, the Pianissimo series will reflect this same generational duality: its second half welcomes Italian Enrico Pieranunzi and local stalwarts Oliver Jones and VIC VOGEL (aged 64, 78 and 77 respectively). The opening acts, in contrast, will be focused on emerging talents making their Montreal festival debut: THIERRY MAILLARD from France, Alexandra Stréliski from Quebec, Gwilym Simcock from England, Harald Lopez-Nussa from Cuba and Thomas Enhco, also from France.

This same phenomenon also occurs in the Jazz d'Ici series, featuring veterans Michael Donato (in a duo with Pierre Tanguay) and Guy Nadon; established artists Yannick Rieu and Andre Leroux; and youthful upstarts Marianne Trudel, Chet Doxas, Julie Lamontagne, Joel Miller and Jacques Kuba Seguin. We should not overlook the Jensen Sisters, Christine from Montreal and Ingrid from New York. And finally, let us not forget a handful of established stars with distinguished track records: Wayne Shorter, Steve Kuhn and David Murray. In sum then: something old, something new, something for everyone... or just about.

showcase for avant-garde musicians of all stylistic stripes, the Suoni per il Popolo has now become a rallying point for fans with venturesome tastes. From alternative rock to electronica, from free jazz to non-idiomatic improv and even an incursion into written contemporary music, musical experimentation is the driving force of this event.

Like all festivals with a proven track record, there are names that hold a special place in the hearts of its organizers. In the "avant-garde jazz" section, reedist KEN VANDERMARK is one of them, to the extent that we've lost track of how many times he's played in town, both during the festival and between them. Yet, he has not appeared in town for a while, but this absence is made up for by a two-night stand (18-19/6). On the first evening, he will spar with compatriot trumpeter Nate Wooley and British drummer Paul Lytton, followed by a duo set by Paal Nilsson-Love (drs.) and Terry Ex (b.) On the second night, he will lead one of his many bands Turn Left with special guest, trumpeter and saxophonist Joe McPhee. The latter will also be heard in a rare duo setting with German reedist Peter Brötzmann in the previous week (10/6), while British saxophonist John Butcher will demonstrate his unique sonic explorations in both solo and group settings (16/6). A guitarist unlike any other, Joe Morris will make his festival debut in a trio setting (22/6). As part of Morris' unit, bassist and festival stalwart William Parker has put together a unique band, the French-American Peace Project (see details in the concert recommendations on page 45, under Discoveries and Bold Strokes). Montreal's own Ensemble SuperMusique will share an evening with the Nouveau Jazz Libre du Québec, a duo comprised of drummer Guy Thouin and saxophonist Brian Highbloom



(20/6). Paired down from 30 to 18 musicians, Nicolas Caloia's Ratchet Orchestra will premiere a specially commissioned work by composer-violinist Malcolm Goldstein (12/6).

Thanks to the initiative of the Bozzini String Ouartet, there will be a focus on the German-Swiss contemporary music collective Wandelweiser. A notable guest here is Austrian trombonist Radu Malfatti, a one-time pioneer of European improvised music in the 1970s but now pursuing a more radical brand of composed minimalism. Also of note are several films showings, including an excellent documentary on German saxophonist Peter Brötzmann entitled "Soldier of the Road" (9/6), "A World of Sound" on the late tenorist Dave S. Ware (13/6) and "Parallax Sounds" on the Chicago jazz scene (17-6), a must see for all fans of Ken Vandermark and his coterie. www.suoniperilpopolo.com

>> UPSTAIRS + MORE FESTIVAL PICKS

Not to be overlooked in the upcoming festival splurge, Upstairs Jazz Bar & Grill is back with its own series. Best known as the mainstream jazz den par excellence in town, this cozy locale will also divide its program between veterans and upstarts. Of the former, pianist BARRY HARRIS, at 83, is no less than the custodian of the bebop flame. True to the form and spirit of his mentors Charlie Parker, Bud Powell and Thelonious Monk, he will peform in a trio setting with two veteran accompanists (28-29/6). Barely a few months younger than the pianist, Helen Merrill is a living legend of vocal jazz. Invited to play at Upstairs in the summer of 2009, the singer cancelled her engagement. But here she is, making up for it in what may well be her penultimate Montreal performances (3-4/7), her first in town since 1986! As for Ranee Lee, she is still very much in fine form and will wind down the series on July 7 with her vocalese.

At first glance, alto saxophonist Greg Osby and pianist Bill Charlap have little in common stylistically, apart from working within the jazz mainstream. The former will appear with first-rate drummer Terry Lynn Carrington in a special quintet project dedicated to Dexter Gordon (30/6). Charlap, for his part, will tickle his ivories (5/7) to the tune of well worn standards that are the bread and butter for many a jazz fan.

On the flip side of the coin, the series will welcome some new comers and repeat Upstairs visitors like guitarist Gilad Hekselman and his trio (27/6) and drummer Colin Stranahan (6/7), not to forget a pair of highlytouted New York drummers, Mark Giuliani (1/7) and Nir Felder (2/7).

In keeping with its reputation, the FIJM runs a gamut of styles in indoor series, five of which are more tightly focused on jazz. For the benefit of the novice fan, here are a few suggestions:

NATIONAL FESTIVAL PICKS

WHEN IT COMES TO the organization and coordination of jazz events, Canada is the envy of our American neighbours, for fans and organizers alike. With almost 20 members, the Jazz Festivals Canada network is not that well known in the communities that are part of it. It is, however, a major help to artists, as it supports them in their national tours. In November, the artistic directors meet in Montreal to field proposals. They select not only headliners and big names, but also Canadian talent who are supported by Canada Arts Council touring grants. In this scheme, artists stand to gain as much as the audience, who are given the opportunity to discover acts both within and beyond our own national borders. Without the indispensible coordination process between festivals, many artists could never cross Canada's vast terrain. In years past, this publication has covered the national jazz scene extensively and this year's column follows in this vein by highlighting some of the principal players who will soon be travelling from coast to coast in the festival circuit.



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

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
